This year, we continued our work in Chittagong and Sylhet in Bangladesh, Colombo, Sri Lanka and in Goa, India. We have continued our unfaltering commitment to improving the education of impoverished students. Education is a lifeline to prosperity. Research shows that supporting education is one of the most effective and efficient ways of promoting social justice and equity. Through our initiatives, we continue our mission to safeguard and uplift the less fortunate. We also were able to feed the hungry among the tribal communities in Bangladesh this summer, alleviating the burden placed on many families due



# MLKF gives a \$20,000.00 grant towards library expansion at Fr. Agnel College in Pilar, Goa, India



Fr. Agnel College of Arts and Commerce was established in June of 1991 to fulfil the needs of the students from the area surrounding the historic Pilar sanctuary, where the remains of Venerable Fr. Agnel are enshrined. Many of the students are academically below average and some belong to economically and socially disadvantaged groups. This college is an extension of the Fr. Agnel High School, which was founded in 1953 and raised to a Higher Secondary level in 1976.

The vision of Fr. Agnel College is education for all without any discrimination. Intellectual competitiveness, hard work, and the values of truth, love and justice are considered core to building a successful group of citizens from all walks of life.

The college is affiliated with the Goa University and was accredited by the National Accreditation and Assessment Council (NAAC) in 2016. NAAC recommended increasing the seating capacity of the present library hall to meet the demands and challenges of the students using the library for studies and research. In addition, the library would also serve the surrounding communities.

Presently, there are about nine hundred (900) students attending the college, of which about 300 are considered as socially disadvantaged. The current library has about 18,000 books, over 100 journals and magazines, newspapers, maps, charts, projects and other digital documents. All the students and staff members are given ID numbers and passwords whereby they can access over 5000 e-journals, 2100 e-books and other digital documents. Since there is no other library in the vicinity, the proposed library when completed will also allow access to members of the community from the neighboring villages.

The Library space will be on the second and the third floors of a new building. Construction is currently underway and is expected to be complete in June of 2021. MLKF has raised money in support of the Library sections/floors in this new building extension. We have already sent a donation of \$20,000.00 to the Fr. Agnel College in June

The Motion Project supports the social and Sri Lanka to provide non-communicable disease facilitated and partially funded these endeavors to The Motion Project has continued to support improve healthcare access in remote regions of Sri Trincomalee, and held medical camps in isolated alone, they were able to provide 40 below-the-knee prosthetic devices, and eye screenings to about 90 people free-of-charge. Particularly due to the impacts of COVID-19, The Motion Project has supported such initiatives to promote health equity and encourage positive health behaviors.
